# MARIJUANA

Marijuana comes from the plant Cannabis Sativa. The psychoactive ingredient in marijuana is Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), which gives it a powerful high when smoked or ingested. Street names for marijuana include pakalolo, pot, weed, Mary Jane and grass.





- Increases heart rate, anxiety and panic attacks
- Reduces ability to learn and retain information
- Interferes with brain function Increased risk of a heart
- Reduces resistance to common illnesses
- Increased risk for asthma bronchitis and emphysema

### MARIJUANA IN THE US & HAWAII

- 45% of youth 12-17 years old reported having used marijuana.
- Marijuana was the primary substance used at the time of admission into treatment for the majority of adolescents (61.2%) in 2014.
- In 2017, 19.8% of high school students in Hawaii currently used
- In 2017, 78% of 18-year-olds reported/shared they have friends that use marijuana.

- Use or distribution of marijuana is a crime under both Hawaii and U.S. law.
- Marijuana is federally illegal in the United States. Federal law trumps state law.
- Recreational marijuana is illegal in the state of Hawaii.
- Medical marijuana is legal for persons with qualifying illnesses, such as terminal cancers. Persons seeking medical marijuana must obtain a doctor's recommendation and register with the State Department of Health to avoid criminal prosecution under state law.
