WHAT IS SPICE?

Synthetic (man-made) drug that provides a high effect similar to marijuana. It contains a mixture of plant materials and man-made chemicals with mind-altering effects.

It is often coated with unknown toxic chemicals, causing a dangerous and unpredictable high. Each package's ingredients can vary so much that a users reaction is unpredictable.







Looks similar to potpourri and is often sold in small bags or containers with small leaves. Packages are often labels "not for human consumption".

HOW IS IT USED?

- Smoking
- Ingested

Smoking through a pipe or joint or mixed with food or liquids.

********************** SIDE EFFECTS

- · increased heart rate
- increased blood pressure
- vomiting and convulsions
- numbness and tingling
- tremors and seizures
- hallucinations

- panic attacks
- paranoia
- giddiness
- · agitation and aggression
- · psychosis
- death

*********** LEGAL PENALTY

- Spice and Bath Salts are illegal to sell and possess in the state of Hawai'i.
- ACT 29: all retailers or persons in possession of spice and bath salts products are in violation of state law and may be prosecuted for possession or distribution of a schedule l controlled substance.
- Considered a class B felony, violators can be prosecuted for up to 10 years or pay a \$10,000 fine.
